



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Equipment needed:

- 4 mm knitting needles
- Darning needle
- Scissors

Abbreviations:

- K= knit stitch
- P= purl stitch
- STS= stitches

Pattern:

1. Using your first days colour, cast on 56, 64 or 72 sts
2. K4,P4. Repeat to end of row.
3. Repeat above row another time.
4. That is your first day complete! Don't cast off just yet in case you need the same colour again tomorrow. For the next day simply repeat 2 and 3.
5. Repeat until all days of the year are done. For our temperature updates please check our social medias or sign up to our newsletter.
6. weave in all ends.



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Beginner instructions

How to cast on:

To cast on you will need your starting colour and your knitting needles. First using your wool, create a slip stitch and slide it onto one of the needles. To create a slip stitch simply create a loop at the end of your yarn and pull the longer side through the loop from back to front. [Like this](#). Be careful not to have it too tight. Next you will need to insert the other needle into this slip stitch, from front to back, and wrap the yarn around the needle from back to front. Carefully pull this through the slip stitch (you should now have a loop on one needle and a slip stitch on the other) and slide it onto the needle which has the slip stitch. Pull to tighten, however you don't want it too tight. Repeat until you have the desired number of stitches on your needles.

How to do a knit stitch:

In much the same way as you cast on, you will insert the other knitting needle into the stitch from front to back. You will then wrap the yarn around from back to front and pull through the stitch. However this time you are going to keep that loop on the needle and slide the stitch you've just gone through off the other needle. [Like this](#)

How to do a purl stitch:

To create a purl stitch you will need to make sure that the yarn is in the front of your work and then insert the needle from back to front of the stitch. You will then wrap the yarn round from back to front and pull the stitch through. Keep this stitch on this needle and drop the 'worked' stitch off the other needle. [Like this](#)

How to change colours:

For this project the easiest way to change colours is to simply start working with your new colour, leaving a tail end. Cut off your previous colour yarn leaving a tail end and tightly knot them together in the back of your work. Then weave in your ends.

How to cast off knit-wise:

To cast off knit-wise (this is the most common way to cast off) you will knit your first two stitches like normal so that you have two stitches on one needle. You will then take the first stitch and slip it over the second so that you now have only one stitch on the needle. Simply knit another stitch and repeat this over the whole row until all stitches have been done. To finish simply cut the yarn with a tail and pull through this last stitch tightly. Weave in the tail end. [Like this](#)

How to weave in ends:

To weave in ends you will need to thread the cut off end of yarn through a darning needle and simply weave that needle through the back of your worked stitches neatly so that it doesn't show through in the front. This secures them so that they are less likely to fray or come loose and makes your work look neater.



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
